Mark September 15 on your calendar for Culture Day in Neubergthal As part of "Thursday in the Village" (see back cover), a treaty event was planned for June 21.

Treaty UnderstandingS, 2018

was the theme of the meeting in the Commons Barn. Indigenous stories are also part of the stories of this place. This was a part of the NHF plan to hear and experience many stories of this place, this area.

Loretta Ross, the treaty commissioner for the Treaty Relations Commission of Manitoba, was the featured guest. The other speakers were from Roseau River First Nation - -Charlie Nelson, lead elder and teaching elder Peter Atkinson.

A small smudge ceremony - - some sage smouldering in a large shell - - began the evening. Charlie Nelson encouraged us to take in, to breathe in, some kindness.

Commissioner Ross presented some context and the need for treaties and reconciliation. In 1800, this land clearly was the homeland of the indigenous people. By 1900, they were guests or clients on reserves in this land. (The world was overturned for indigenous people in Canada in the 19th century.)

There are different views of the treaties among indigenous people, even among the people at Roseau Some aspects of treaties are tested within the Canadian constitution and within the Canadian court system. On the other hand, some aspects of treaties need to be parallel to the Canadian system. Some parts of the constitution need to be tested within the treaties.

Reflection

We all want a better future for our children and grandchildren. We must do better than has been done to this point. We are neighbouring families. New ways of sharing this land are needed. There will be more conversations and meetings.

A Short Story of Neubergthal Heritage Foundation

Part 1 - beginnings and heritage features

Neubergthal was designated as a national heritage site by Parks Canada, "having both historical and architectural significance." This includes the whole village, not just some of the older buildings. Parks did not impose any policies or by-laws on the village.

Historic Features

In the 1980's Parks Canada decided they wanted a place to show something about the Canadian prairies, early agriculture settlement and changing agriculture in Canada. Parks did a survey across western Canada to find a place to show and tell these stories. Parks chose the village of Neubergthal as the best place to experience some of the early permanent agricultural settlements on the open prairie. There are many other villages in southern Manitoba and in other places. (Stirling, Alberta, a Mormon community was also designated at the same time because the Mormons brought irrigation to the Prairies.)

- The land map of a village is not the ordinary homestead or land ownership pattern. The early Mennonite immigrants were given special permission to live in villages - this would help them survive on the prairies.
- The size and layout of the yards show unique patterns. - most yards are approx 14 acres, having enough pasture for 8 horses and 5 cows.
- Building patterns tell many stories
 Original buildings and layouts and also buildings which show changes made over the years are here. Most buildings were set back from the street, usually at a uniform distance, were perpendicular to the street, with the front facing south or east

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- The single street and the rows of trees along the street and along property boundaries are trademarks of these villages. The trees were mostly cottonwood and Manitoba maple.

After Parks had done some preliminary work, the village decided to accept this heritage designation. Parks was very clear that they were not making rules for the village. They said to the village, 'we think you have something important here. We will help you preserve some of this and we will help you to tell, to share, some of the stories of the the prairies and farming.'

Neubergthal Heritage Foundation (NHF) NHF was incorporated in 1997. Following are some statements from the constitution. *Purpose and Goals*

- 1) Maintaining and preserving the historic and heritage aspects of Neubergthal, and
- 2) making these historic and heritage aspects of Neubergthal available and interesting to the public, as appropriate.

The board of the NHF shall be composed of a minimum of five members and a maximum of nine members; at least two-thirds of the committee shall be local (local means residents of Neubergthal, and also former residents and family members living within 20 miles of the village).

Over the years, many people have been members of the board.

Update on the Barn and the Commons

The basics on the barn construction are done. Now comes another critical part - the finishing touches - decor, the little things that strike our eye and our imagination.

To this point the barn project has cost approx 750,000.00 Parks Canada is paying 50% for the restoration work. The local 50%, the portion to be covered by NHF, has come from donations, pledges and a mortgage. Approx \$100,000.00 of the mortgage still needs to be covered. Donations and pledges are needed, invited and gladly received.

And there is more for the overall plan. Kitchen facilities are needed for the house and barn. The interior of the house needs more work. There are other things to be added- - -a roof for the picnic area, a playground area, landscaping and the list goes on.
