

HONEY BEES IN NEUBERGTHAL

If you are a honey bee in Neubergthal in winter, you would probably be in a hive in a barn on the yard of John & Joanne Isaak. John Isaak and Mike Hildebrand work with 200 hives. They built the hives, the supers and the internal frames. All this began six or seven years ago in conversations when they were ice fishing. Christmas Eve

In spring each hive contains 10,000 bees, maybe more. During summer there may be five times as many bees in the hive.

The queen begins to lay eggs, up to 2000/day. The queen has mated once at the beginning of her life and can lay fertilized and unfertilized eggs. The eggs hatch in three to five days. Some worker bees are assigned to care for the eggs, the larvae and the pupae. 42 days after the eggs are laid, the worker bees are ready.

To produce ONE pound of honey, a hive needs to fly a combined total of 55000 miles (some say more). A worker bee will live 6 weeks. A single bee produces approximately 0.8 gram (one twelfth of a teaspoon) of honey in her six week life span. Bees have two stomachs - one for regular feeding and one for bringing nectar back to the hive. Wings beat about 200 times per SECOND.


SPORTS EXHIBIT


MEMORIAL WALK

HOUSE AND KITCHEN PROJECT

Food, or coffee n snacks, always brightens every gathering or tour or program. The next priority for NHF is to have this option right at the Commons. A kitchen/food committee has been making plans.



NHF wants to complete the work on the Klippenstein/Commons House. The footing, the roof and siding repair and a new outside coat of paint have already been done. Commercial kitchen equipment was purchased when a local restaurant closed; this was paid by immediate donations.

Insulation, wiring, plumbing, installing the kitchen and finishing the other rooms are next steps. Kitchen and coffee area are at the north end of the house. (see illustration) The two south rooms would be a multipurpose room (dining, meeting or small theatre) and library (and office?). donation

Present mortgage not covered by pledges is approximately \$100,000.00.
